

Story Summary

Create a memory game with rhyming words: frog, dog; by, eye; group, troop; letter, better; hand, band; toes, nose; regret, bet; neigh, hay, say, stay, away, dismay; too, you; high, sky; roared, accord; dot, astronaut; goodbye, cry; utter, mutter; bunny, funny; fun, one; fear, hear; out, spout; feet, defeat; cared, prepared; flow, grow; hand, understand; small, stall; head, instead; sound, ground; alert, hurt; right, reunite; shrugged, hugged; wait, state.

Have children circle vowels in a list of words.

Create a traceable vowel sheet a, e, i o, u.

Can U Save the Day?

Can U Save the Day? is a story about how important vowels are to words. When the vowels leave the farm, the consonants realize that even though the vowel group may be small in number they are as important to words as the consonants are.

Discuss the story and write your answers together.

What is Can U Save the Day? about?
What is the setting of the story? (Where does the story take place?)
How many of the animals in the story have you seen and heard? Can you make the sounds the animals make?
Can you name all of the vowels? Can you name all of the consonants?
Describe what you think it would be like if there were no vowels to make words and sounds.
