Bobs, The Monkey Who Forgot

"Oh! Isn't he tiny?" said the little girls, and they threw a banana to him. Bobs pulled off the peel and took a bite² with his small white teeth. It was nice. 

"Never mind!" said his mother. "Look! The sun is shining again."




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
